Sustainable Livelihoods Study Phase 2: Terms of Reference to join our Technical Advisory Panel as West-Africa Regional Specialists

ABOUT THE FAIRTRADE-MONDELEZ PARTNERSHIP

Together at Mondelez International and Fairtrade, we are proud of our longstanding partnership to secure the long-term future of cocoa farming communities. Fairtrade started working alongside Cadbury in 2009, when cocoa sourced for Cadbury Dairy Milk was Fairtrade-certified for the very first time. In 2012, Cadbury became a part of Mondelēz International, and the Cadbury Cocoa Partnership evolved into what is now Cocoa Life: Mondelēz International's global cocoa sustainability programme. In 2016, Mondelēz International approached the Fairtrade Foundation to discuss how we could work together to integrate the rigour of the Fairtrade standards and approach into the Cocoa Life programme. Therefore, our relationship has evolved over the years to scale up impact in farming communities, from certification to working together on the ground with farmers where it matters most.

ABOUT THE SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS LANDSCAPE STUDY

As part of this partnership, since June 2018 the Fairtrade Foundation has carried out a research project, led by the Monitoring, Evaluation & Learning (MEL) team and known as the Sustainable Livelihoods Landscape Study. The first phase of this study completed a landscape analysis and comparative review of Sustainable Livelihoods Initiatives in Ghana and Cote D'Ivoire, where 60% of global cocoa is produced annually. It also identified strengths, weaknesses, duplications, gaps and opportunities within current approaches and extrapolated an industry-level sustainable livelihoods theory of change. This work has now been published and is available here (links to original documents are included at the end of the launching blog post). Whilst through this research we have achieved a clear understanding of what is currently being done, we are now at the stage of asking what *needs* to be done (and change) to achieve sustainable livelihoods for cocoa farming communities in West Africa – and defining a role for our partnership on this journey.

The second phase of the research will then cover the following objectives:

- Develop a roadmap to achieve sustainable livelihoods for cocoa-growing communities in West Africa and drive definition of a new way for national, regional and international actors to partner in this endeavour
- ii. Ensure that the initiatives within the defined roadmap will be set up to target the needs and constrains of the most marginalized groups such as non-organized farmers; informal labor; sharecroppers; geographically isolated
- iii. Define a strong alignment of intents between the sector and the farmers in order to identify a list of areas for farmer-centric interventions that will contribute towards the sustainability roadmap

By the end of this phase, we will have produced a publication defining a future vision for the cocoa sector to achieve sustainable livelihoods that the partnership will disseminate and use to catalyse transformative and lasting change for the cocoa farming communities. We will also



have a set of conceptual interventions for the sector to move towards taking a proactive function within this vision.

THE TECHNICAL ADVISORY PANEL

To support this study, Fairtrade Foundation is setting up an advisory panel, to provide an independent perspective on the technical aspects of our research. We envisage the panel formed by specialists in value chains analysis, human-centred design research and regional experts.

Topics that the panel will provide input to could include: methodological approaches, tools and templates; critical analysis and review of work done to date, a sounding board for different approaches or troubleshooting, networking and facilitating access to key stakeholders, and reviews of key documents as appropriate.

The panel will primarily support the core research team based at the Fairtrade Foundation, who will collate, filter and present technical inputs for the panel to review. The research team will also approach individual panel members to provide advice on specific areas or research outputs. The panel will meet at regular points throughout the study – to be agreed during the inception phase. Where required, members of the panel may be also required to conduct discrete pieces of work to inform the study.

This panel is NOT a decision-making board or steering committee as those roles are already provided under the current governance structures on both this study and the partnership.

SCOPE OF WORK - REGIONAL SPECIALISTS

The West-Africa Regional Specialist(s) are key roles within the panel. They will provide contextual and technical advice specifically on the two countries that the study is covering – Ghana and Cote d'Ivoire. They will review fieldwork tools and make introductions to relevant stakeholders and may take part in some parts of the data collection. Depending on the emerging needs of the research team, the expert(s) may also accompany the team on the field. The researchers will work closely with the Fairtrade Africa teams in Ghana and Cote d'Ivoire.

NB Whilst a limited requirement for field-visits may emerge within this consultancy (all field-trips costs will be separately covered by Fairtrade Foundation), this role requires that most of the interactions with the research team are handled remotely (via online call facilities); a requirement will be then to have access to a stable internet signal and be available for prescheduled online meetings between 9:00 and 17:00 GMT (London office working hours)

CONSULTANT(S) PROFILE

The role may be played by one expert, with knowledge across both Ghana and Côte d'Ivoire, or by two individuals to advise on each country. We are looking for individuals who work well in a team, and can be adaptive and innovative with their advice. Key skills we are looking for are:

- Detailed knowledge of the cocoa sector in each country, including the underlining political economy and the key regional stakeholders
- Good connections with key industry stakeholders and the ability and willingness to make introductions on behalf of the research team



- Fieldwork experience, including reviewing fieldwork guides and tools (experience designing fieldwork approaches is desirable but not essential)
- Experience working with a research team and providing advice in a multidisciplinary setting is desirable
- Being based in Ghana and/or Côte d'Ivoire is desirable

We are open to hearing how individuals will approach this task in a concise cover letter (see details below)

BUDGET

This position is available on a call-down contract of approximately 20 to 28 days, spread over a period of approximately an eight to eleven months period, and we are seeking a mid to senior level expert. Applications will be reviewed in alignment with the other advisor profiles to create the team and to make final offers.
